The executive committee has continued to meet monthly to ensure the smooth running of the Association. We have had large expenses of close to \$30,000 including insurance, rates, servicing of the stove and dishwasher, refurbishment of the floor and replacing batteries in two AEDs. Our gas costs have risen to \$400 a month during winter.

While we have been increasing our funds through membership fees and some of the events we have held over the last three months, we would like to introduce new activities. We had several new and expanded initiatives in late 2022 and 2023 when very enthusiastic, energetic members raised money for the refurbishment and maintenance of the hall. This was appreciated by everyone, not just because funds were raised but because the activities were enjoyed.

While that energy is not available to us at this time, we still have much to do to improve the hall, including internal and external painting and refurbishment of the kitchen. The hall sub-committee has set up a working party to look at the kitchen, toilets and storage. When they put forward initial suggestions we will ensure that users have input and we will gauge community support.

This sort of project is long term and could be anything from \$50,000 to \$150,000 so we will need to look at how it is financed. Government grants are available from timeto-time and we look at them very carefully but usually you need firm plans, current quotes, obvious benefits to the community clearly articulated, evidence of community support and often at least 50% cocontribution. We have two members of the executive who consider which grants are available. We have been shortlisted for the Australia Post **Community Grants Validation** Process. This is a \$2,000 to \$5,000 grant and the amount of information required is extensive and detailed. It only means they'll look at the application after we submit further information. We are also applying to the Central Coast Council to have a rate subsidy. Our grants team have put a lot of time and effort into these applications.

THE SCIENCE OF CLIMATE CHANGE

Dr John Palmer

This is a summary of the presentation that Dr John Palmer gave to the August Lunch Club:

The concept that global warming has been produced by industrial activities that increase the amount of carbon dioxide in the atmosphere remains a subject of controversy, despite a mountain of scientific evidence and its acceptance by all the world's major scientific bodies.

It is my view that the scientific evidence is so strong that it is time that all the world should unite in an endeavour to avoid the disaster that would ensue if the average world temperature was to rise too far. If we fail to adequately tackle this problem average temperature will be some 2.5 to 3.5 degrees centigrade by the end of this century, and human life, if it survives, will be under enormous stress.

It is often assumed that concern regarding atmospheric "greenhouse gases" did not occur until the mid-20th century, and sceptics seem to believe it is a scam introduced by "lefties", "greenies", and scientists eager for research grants. In reality, it dates to the early 19th century.

Writing around 1820 Joseph Ferrier noted that calculations indicated that the distance of the earth from the sun was such that the earth should be much colder. He postulated that something in the atmosphere was acting to increase the temperature: but he did not know what it was.

Only recently has the work of the American scientist Eunice Newton Foote been recognised. In experiments using an air pump, glass cylinders and thermometers, she found that increasing the proportion of carbon dioxide or water vapour in a cylinder filled with air caused a rise in temperature when exposed to sunlight. This did not happen with other gases such as nitrogen. Her findings were reported in 1856. She theorised that "an atmosphere of this gas would give our earth a high temperature; and if the air had mixed with it a larger proportion than at present an increased temperature would necessarily result".

Three years later in, 1859, John Tyndall described his own similar experiments but with a different methodology (It is not known whether he was aware of Foote's work). He found that oxygen and nitrogen are almost transparent to radiant heat, whilst carbon dioxide and water vapour absorb and then re-emit radiant heat. He suggested that without these gases in the atmosphere "the earth would be held in the iron grip of frost."

Then in 1896 Svente Arrhenius calculated how effective raised levels of carbon dioxide would be in raising temperatures and found that "The temperature of the Arctic regions would rise about 8 or 9 degrees if the carbon dioxide level increased to 2.5 to 3.5 degrees times its present value".

The Swedish meteorologist Gustaf Elkholm in 1899 speculated that the continued burning of coal would double the atmospheric carbon dioxide which "would undoubtedly cause a very obvious rise in the mean temperature of the earth".

In 1938 Guy Stewart Callender outlined research that showed that during the earth's history temperatures had closely followed the level of atmospheric carbon dioxide. Like others before him he thought a rise might be beneficial "by delaying a return of the deadly glaciers".

By 1960 scientists were warning of the extent of the problem. Charles Keating began to take measurements of atmospheric carbon dioxide in locations around the world and found that they were inexorably rising. By now there was a great deal of scientific evidence available, and it had become increasingly difficult to deny that the "greenhouse effect" was not real, and the prospect of severe weather conditions that would ensue.

More widespread public concern was raised by a interview with Gilbert Plass in Time magazine. He warned "At the present rate of increase the carbon dioxide in the atmosphere will raise the earth's temperature 1.5 degrees Fahrenheit every hundred years for centuries to come".

By 1980 there was by now a large amount of research publications on this subject in peer-reviewed journals. The atmospheric concentration of carbon dioxide was continuing to rise, as were average world temperatures. By the beginning of the 21st century almost all scientists working in this field supported the theory of man-induced global warming and this was endorsed by the world's science academies and societies.

Rising temperatures bring with them many dangers:

- Heat waves. 1,800 people died at the recent Hajj in Mecca, and temperatures of 52 degrees centigrade were reported. At about the same time many deaths, and temperatures of 49C, were recorded in India. Closer to home, on January 4th 2020 the Sydney suburb of Penrith sweltered at 48.9 C
- Increased rainfall with increased episodes of flooding. A flood in Afghanistan this year killed 300 people.
- Longer and more intense episodes of drought.
- Wildfires. In 2023 the total area burned was eight times higher than the previous average.
- Higher sea water levels effecting islands and coastal areas.
- Deleterious effects on agriculture. Areas of famine.
- Shrinking of glaciers.




Members of John's family related the story of his remarkable life describing him as a quiet achiever.
