

OUR LAGOON

Some of you may have read in the local papers this week of a state government grant to help bring our lagoon back to a healthy position.



We have in our village an ancient lagoon that some say was here in the ice age.

It has become home of large numbers of native wild life, including Black Ducks, Wood Ducks, Chestnut and Grey Teals, Swamp fowl, Dusty Moore Hens, Herons, Spoon Bills, Pelicans and Cormorants. It is a very important Lagoon.

When we first moved to Pearl Beach, nearly 28 years ago it was a quite deep waterway. Now it has become quite shallow.

The real impact on the lagoon happened about 14 to 20 years ago. You may remember an accident that lead the Council doing an audit if it's drains. Some may remember the stop/go men on our road, for months. All the drains were directed into three drains into the lagoon. No silt traps were installed and the lagoon started to silt up.

Over the years we started started agitating the council.

The group of us; including Ann and Stephen Parsons, Jane Borton, Fay Austin, Taras Mencinsky, David & Bev George, Vickii & I (and others), have worked with the council to improve the state of the lagoon. This resulted in obtaining three grants over the years.

This resulted in two significant, but inaccurate reports on the lagoon. What a waste of money.

This grant the council has received from the from the state government is specifically for the installation of stilt traps, on two drains into the lagoon, thus reducing the silt washing into the lagoon. It will also be used for planting of native plants around the lagoon.

Ideally we would like to see an island in the lagoon, as we have had in the past, to assist with the breeding of our native birds. This will mean applying for further grants through the council. Over the years we have worked closely with the council, in particular and more recently with our local state member; Leisl Tesch. I want to thank them for their work towards this.

NEIGHBOURHOOD SAFER PLACE

The Pearl Beach Progress Association (PBPA) in 2022 was fortunate to receive \$91K funding from the Australian Government's Black Summer Bushfire Recovery grants to upgrade our Memorial Community Hall (Hall) with substantial bushfire resilience measures to offer our community a place of refuge with significantly improved safety compared to retreating to the current unsheltered beach location in the event of a major bushfire.



With the implementation and installation of active bushfire protection sprinklers to protect the Hall buildings, independent water supply with 18kl steel rainwater tanks and due to delays recently installed a spearpoint pump giving extended operating time for sprinklers and additional water to supply RFS trucks. Also a backup power supply with solar, batteries and generator giving highly reliable supply for 48+ hours, Central Coast Bushfire Management Committee and NSW Rural Fire Service approved the Hall as a Neighbourhood Safer Place. The Hall infrastructure includes an AED, first aid supplies, toilet washroom facilities, NBN/phone and a functioning kitchen.

The PBPA's Hall project has successfully created a substantially more resilient "last resort" place for residents to shelter if unable to evacuate from a major fire. The Hall will also be an excellent resource in other catastrophic events such as major storms, road closures and power outages within the village The Hall project was designed, project managed and installed by community volunteers.

The Hall / Neighbourhood Safety Place is also available for use by all NSW Emergency Services as a hub during a fire or storm when power is out in the village. NSP Operations Manual is in place and physical training in the activation and operation of the NSP commenced in March 2023.

Further training (to refresh existing and skill up new operators, and familiarisation for residents), will be held each year in September ahead of the start of bushfire season. The hall bushfire safety sprinkler systems provide a safe haven for residents trapped in Pearl Beach by a fire, which is likely to cut the road and power for hours We hope we won't have to use it, but if and when we do it will save lives.

Pearl Beach Overview - located in the Central Coast Council (LGS Category 2) is at high risk from both bushfire and severe storms emanating from the effects of climate change. In particular:

- Pearl Beach is surrounded by the Brisbane Water National Park on ridges hemming the village on three sides, and up to 4km of dense bush.
 Fires in this area are an everpresent risk.
- Around 120 of the 660
 properties in the village
 directly abut the National
 Park and all are within 500m
 of the bush. Many people
 in these properties may
 need to be evacuated. The
 village is heavily vegetated
 and vulnerable to prolonged
 ember attack.
- The village is served by a single 2km road surrounded by dense bushland on either side. The risks of this road being cut off are as follows:
- Fire or fallen trees, isolating the village for hours or in catastrophic event possibly days.
- Single overhead powerline could be out for hours or days.
- Many residents are elderly/ frail some requiring medical equipment or medicines which need refrigeration.

The Hall / Neighbourhood Safer Place will primarily ensure the survival and refuge of not only the Pearl Beach community/residents but also to the significant number of holiday makers and visitors to Pearl Beach.

HALL ASSISTANCE REQUIRED

Paul Wickham, who has been the sound and lighting person for the Pearl Beach Hall for many years, is stepping down from that roll at the end of the year.

The Progress Association is obviously keen to find a replacement for him so we are looking for someone to take over that role, or maybe a team to share the responsibilities. We are looking for anyone who may have experience in theatre production, TV work or a Hi Fi enthusiast. Paul will be available to train people in the role until the end of the year.

At the recent Pearl Beach Music and Piano Scholarship Concerts Jean and Dr John Irvine were acknowledged for their long time involvement and commitment to the Pearl Beach Community. The Irvine story started many years ago, John is one of four brothers and their Pearl Beach visits actually started in the early 1940's. Their mother had been visiting Pearl Beach since 1926 staying at one of the earliest built houses - 'Noonameena'.

As the brothers grew older it became an annual ritual for the family to pack up at Christmas time and head for Pearl Beach and 'Noonameena', or other houses. They would catch the steam train to Woy Woy, and then the Pearl Beach bus and this family ritual eventually included taking their dog.

The bus journey to Pearl Beach was always an adventure with the bumpy ride on the dirt road for most of the trip and early experience the bus drove on the cliff road around Mt Ettalong. At one stage all four of the 'Irvine boys' owned land and houses at Pearl Beach. John continued his passion for Pearl Beach when he and his wife Jean moved to Cornelian Road. Their community commitment journey continued.

John's parents were passionate about music and music education and John and his brothers decided to donate a lovely piano to the Pearl Beach Memorial Hall in their memory, hence the Pearl Beach Piano and Scholarship concerts were introduced in 2005.

Dr John Irvine, one of Australia's most seen, heard and read paediatric psychologists has recently launched his new book '80 Stories High' sharing 80 uplifting stories from his illustrious career working with children and their families.

Jean Irvine, an educator and as a musician and pianist works and encourages aspiring young students generously sharing her love of music and professional skills in numerous ways. Over many vears she has involved herself in Pearl Beach musical concerts and Kids Club activities. Jean was instrumental in helping to re-establish the Pearl Beach Glee Club concerts as musical conductor and at times directing the annual concerts. Her musical involvement has continued with the Pearl Beach Singers and the annual Scholarship and Showcase concerts.

Jean and John continue to dedicate their time and professional skills to the Pearl Beach Community and we thank them.






Dorothy was also a member of the Pearl Beach executive and acted as the Publicity Officer. The two of them were always available to assist with events and sell raffle tickets at the cafe. When Dorothy passed away Bill continued managing what had become the Easter Saturday Book Fair with proceeds toward the Memorial Hall upkeep and repairs until he also decided to retire.

Bill was a passionate cruise passenger and over the years sailed on most of the Cunard ships as well as many others. He continued coming to Pearl Beach every weekend keeping a fairly private profile.

In recent years the book fair has been managed by Victoria Crawford, and more recently Alison Phillips has taken over the reigns.
