- The Convenor may not sign any letter, email or other submission on behalf of the PBPA, unless it is signed by a member of the PBPA Executive Committee who has reviewed and approved the submission:
- The Sub-committee cannot, without the approval of the PBPA Executive Committee:
- Apply for grants;
- Issue Media releases or have other contact with media outlets.

Duration:	Ongoing
Objective/ P	urpose:

The objective of the Environment Sub-committee (formerly the Pearl Beach Environment Group) is to "protect and enhance the environment and encourage nature conservation within the village of Pearl Beach". The definition of 'environment' is used in its broadest sense, which includes both the 'built' and the 'natural' environment, and the 'environmental setting' of Pearl Beach.

Aims:

The aims of the Environment Sub-committee are:

- a) To educate property owners, residents and visitors about the special qualities of Pearl Beach and its setting, including its environmental and cultural significance.
- b) To promote recognition by authorities and other relevant groups of the special qualities of Pearl Beach and its setting.
- c) To promote the principles of sustainable development.
- To support the conservation of biodiversity and the protection of indigenous wildlife populations and habitats to promote the conservation, planting and maintenance of native vegetation, particularly vegetation indigenous to the area, and especially to encourage retention of the existing tree cover.

- e) To promote development that is sympathetic to the Pearl Beach environment and character – and to the immediate context of each development - particularly with regard to discouraging intrusive designs with excessive site coverage, bulk and height. To recognise that to achieve this often a level of urban, architectural and landscape design skills are required.
- f) To promote development that is in accordance with relevant government legislation and guidelines.
- g) To work with other relevant groups in Pearl Beach, on the Central Coast, and elsewhere to achieve the objective and aims of the subcommittee.

Scope:

The scope of activities of the Environment Sub-committee include:

- Community consultation, education and awareness raising in accordance with PBEG aims.
- Lobbying and submissions on relevant government (including local government)
 policies and strategies and the implementation of those policies and strategies.
- Submissions on selected individual development proposals where the aims and objectives of the relevant legislation and guidelines are not being met in the proposal, and which may, if approved, result in a negative impact on the environment and character of Pearl Beach.
- Providing advice and input to the PBPA Executive Committee and members on matters relating to the environment and nature conservation within the village of Pearl Beach.

- Assisting individual members of the PBPA to make submissions as outlined under actions 1-3 above (e.g. providing information on how to make a credible individual submission).
- 6. Liaising with similar groups in Pearl Beach and on the Central Coast.

Financial Delegations / Limitations:

- \$500 for any one activity.
- Amounts over \$500 require approval from Executive Committee
- Annual limit refer to approved PBPA budget/s for each year.

Other Delegations:

The Sub-committee Convenor may sign a letter, email or other submission on behalf of the PBPA in accordance with these Terms of Reference and the PBPA Constitution and Guidelines. Any submission must be approved in advance by at least two other members of the Sub-committee.

The Subcommittee cannot without the approval of the PBPA Executive Committee:

- · Apply for grants
- · Issue media releases or have other contact with the media.

Other Notes:

The annual PBPA budget is to include a line item for the activities of the Sub-committee.

At least one member of the Sub-committee is to be a member of the PBPA Executive Committee, and is to be responsible to providing monthly reports to the Executive and reporting at PBPA General Meetings regarding the activities of the Sub-committee. A member of the Sub-committee is to brief the PBPA Executive Committee at its monthly.

The Sub-committee can draw on external advice as required.

Subcommittee submissions, meeting notes and other relevant documentation will be copied to the PBPA Executive Committee through the Secretary.

a natural & cultural inheritance

Pearl Beach village has spectacular scenic qualities set in a small, friendly, caring community which enjoys living in the middle of a national park - Brisbane Water National Park.

Thanks to the stewardship and foresight of previous generations, a remarkable diversity of plants and animals still exists here.

For many thousands of years the traditional Aboriginal owners and custodians of the land - the Darkingjung people combined fishing and harvesting animals in the sheltered bay and fertile sandplain.

In March 1788 when the first Europeans

at the southern end of the beach, the Aborigines helped to pull up their boats

For the next 130 years, because of its isolation and difficult access, our sandplain escaped clearing and colonial settlement. Some trees were cut in the 1850s by Rock Davis (a ship builder and early landholder), and in the 1880s by timber-getters for the Sydney-Gosford glossy black cockatoos and rock warblers). Railway line, but the area remained uninhabited.

In 1921 the Rock Davis Estate was bought by real estate developer Charles Staples, who subdivided it into 570 blocks and cut a road (now a cliff path) below Mt Ettalong.

(Governor Phillip and crew) rowed ashore Still 'Pearly' remained largely undeveloped - in 1950 there were only 90 dwellings.

> Today the village has around 600 blocks, but as most streets and properties retain a natural tree cover, native animals have something in which to feed, shelter and breed. Thus, our wildlife includes an impressive array of rare and threatened species (eg koalas, quolls,

> Pearly's natural heritage has inspired many artists, musicians, poets and writers. Help ensure this rich heritage is passed on to future generations to enjoy - by sharing and protecting our unique plant and animal communities.

In recognition of the significance of our village and its environmental and historic features, Pearl Beach is listed by the National Trust (NSW). Many well-known environmentalists have settled in Pearl Beach and contributed to its conservation, including Minard Crommelin, Lois Westlake and Vincent Serventy.

To ensure this proud conservation tradition continues in the community, our overview is presented as a reference for use by all residents and visitors.

We hope the guide helps everyone understand and appreciate the high environmental and aesthetic values of our village, its wildlife and setting surrounded by sea and national park.

preferential voting






Working Party Reports

- Thank the community for referring road, roadside and drainage matters to the Roads working group.
- Special thanks to Duncan Bridel, Stephen Parsons, John Haynes, Doug McDonald and Lisa Ritchie for road surveys and collation of data.
- Since Dec 22, apprx 125 road defects across our network have been surveyed and notified to CCC
- As previously reported, CCC Director of Infrastructure had suggested that we forward proposals for re heavy patching (structural repairs). A proposal to treat 2,500m2 of roads across our network has been sent to them for discussion and asking for a meeting to discuss.
- Refer to kmz file: Red flags, show defects incl, location, nature of defect, image and CCC incident number. Green squares show patching proposals.

- And a replacement for our collapsed boardwalk.


Pearl Beach Plodders

"I always say: United we stand, divided we fall."




